



QSC SARAH PARVIN TOURNAMENT CAMPING



The Quakertown Soccer Club and Sarah Parvin Foundation want you to have an enjoyable experience at the Sarah Parvin SoccerFest. We have a few rules we ask your assistance with to make everyone's experience top-notch.

Please note the same site rules apply as noted on the No Problem/No Chance List

TENT AREAS

- Tent Areas are all around the complex. Space is First-Come, First-Served
- Please only take the space you need.
- Please note the two retention basins on the map. If it rains hard, you will be in a big puddle. You may like that – we just wanted you to know.
- WALKWAYS – please be mindful not to have your tent on any part of the walkways through the tent area. This is for your protection and for the ease of accessing your tent.
- WALKING PATHS – there are walking paths *around* the Facility – Please observe a 5' barrier on either side of this path. This leaves everyone enough space to access the back corners of the facility, and especially, in case of Emergency.

HEAVY CAMPING – R/Vs

- RV Camping is at the rear of the facility and is First-Come, First-Served.
- Please respect the space of the others. Please take **ONLY** the RV space you need. The space is not marked so please take care to limit your space.
- We have no Water or Electrical Hookups available
- There are no dumping stations for Gray or Black Water
- Generators **ARE** permitted. We do ask for some consideration on noise issues – Please be respectful of your neighbors – see below.
- R/V Location – You must **ONLY** park RVs in the designated area. It is a little farther away, but it is mostly flat and more wide open. You may also see some RVs in Staff Parking. That is for QSC people working the tournament. We appreciate your understanding.

NOTES

- GRILLS – look we would love it if you would buy all of the food we provide, but if you want to bring a propane or electric grill, that's fine.
- CHARCOAL GRILLS, CAMPFIRES and OPEN FLAMES – are **NOT** permitted on the grounds. Sorry, but this is just good practice and the dry weather further necessitates this need.
- GENERATORS - A generator can be very noisy. The quieter, the better, as a generator should not be an abusive device. Sound or noise is potentially damaging sound levels range from 85 to 110 decibels, and some generators create this much noise. For every 10 decibels, a sound is half as loud, so a generator at 72 decibels sounds half as loud as a generator running at 82 decibels. So it's like all energy is subject to the law of squares so each doubling of the distance from a generator, the sound drops by about 10 decibels. We would prefer generators who have a decibel level no higher than 72.
- TRASH – Please pick up all trash and garbage when you leave and place it near a trash receptacle **OR**, if you can, walk it to the Trash Dumpster located near the football complex on your way out. This will save our clean-up crew some valuable time.
